The Jewish Federation of Greater Houston is the convener, connector, funder, and innovator that strengthens Jewish life in Houston, Israel, and worldwide.

This past year, our collective efforts answered critical needs for Jewish education, teen engagement, Israel support, and community resilience. From raising over \$26 million to funding innovative programs and responding to crises like the October 7 attacks in Israel, we've shown what's possible when our community unites.

The Jewish Federation raises and allocates money—here locally, globally, and in Israel—and executes robust programmatic offerings that keep our community connected.

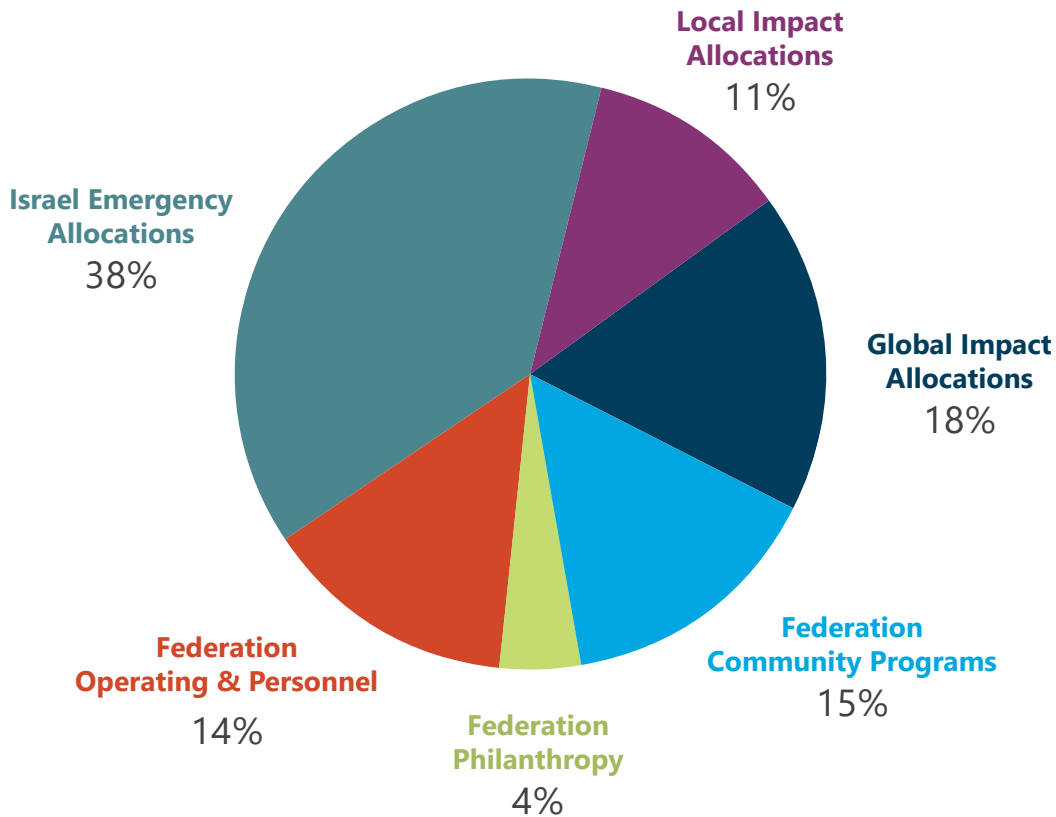

How Do We Repair the World?

THE GENEROSITY OF THE GREATER HOUSTON JEWISH COMMUNITY

Donors are the lifeblood of the Jewish Federation. Your generosity enables us to fulfill our mission to care for the vulnerable, support Jewish education, and strengthen our community. This year, we raised a record-breaking **\$27 million** across all campaigns, including **\$8.6 million** through the Annual Campaign.

The **Annual Campaign** is the foundation of Jewish Houston. It is how the Federation provides core support to the organizations that make up the fabric of our community including Alexander Jewish Family Service, the Evelyn Rubenstein Jewish Community Center, Seven Acres Senior Care Services, our Jewish day schools, Hillels and Chabads on college campuses, and programs and organizations serving every age and stage of Jewish life. It is also how Houstonians make their mark on the Jewish world, funding organizations and programs that build community and care for the vulnerable in Israel and more than 70 countries globally. PHILANTHROPIC HIGHLIGHT

The Robinson/Brown Family made a transformative \$1 million gift to expand YAD and rename it to honor the legacy of Minnette and Jerome Robinson.

Now named the "Minnette and Jerome Robinson Family Young Adult Division (YAD)" of the Jewish Federation of Greater Houston, the program is a vital part of Houston's Jewish community. The program helps ensure young Jewish adults in Houston are knowledgeable about Jewish issues, and skilled leaders who are philanthropically minded and committed to Israel and global Jewry.

AM YISRAEL CHAI: HOUSTON SUPPORTS ISRAEL

Since October 7, 2023, the Federation, in partnership with the Houston Jewish Community Foundation, has raised more than \$15 million in support for our Israel Emergency efforts. More than 98% of funds raised in the first phase (through November 20, 2024), have been distributed to 68 organizations and programs. Making an immediate impact where it is most needed, funds support basic needs, economic rebuilding and recovery, emergency medical services and healthcare, mental health and trauma relief, schools, and media outreach.

Mental Health Needs in Israel

Houston was one of four Federations, alongside Jewish Federations of North America, to contribute to the creation of 16 community-based mental-health centers in Israel that will provide much-needed services. The first center opened in November 2024. There is an increased demand for mental health support in Israel, particularly for post-traumatic stress disorder, since Oct. 7. Mental health and trauma relief is one of the focus areas that our Israel Emergency Fund is supporting, including providing a \$500,000 grant to build these centers.



Gadi Moses Returns to Kibbutz Nir Oz

Gadi Moses (age 80) helped build Kibbutz Nir Oz with his bare hands. It was here, where Gadi was living in retirement, that he was captured by Hamas on October 7, 2023. His wife was murdered in the attack. Gadi was held hostage by Hamas for 482 days, enduring isolation, starvation, and torture.

Upon his release, the first thing that Gadi—an agronomist and farmer—did, even before reuniting with his family, was look into the cameras and declare, “I vow to help rehabilitate Kibbutz Nir Oz.”

Kibbutz Nir Oz and most of its farming equipment were destroyed during the attacks, an intentional effort to cripple Israel’s agricultural and economic base. As a part of the collective effort, our Houston Jewish community—through the Federation’s Israel Emergency Fund—supports ReGrow Israel, an organization dedicated to restoring fields and agricultural equipment in the western Negev area, a region critical to Israel’s food supply. We have allocated \$650,000 to ReGrow Israel.

This also meant that our Houston Jewish community played a special part in Gadi’s homecoming to Nir Oz. As he returned, farmers of the Gaza Envelope lined road 232 with their newly acquired tractors to welcome him home. These tractors were purchased with ReGrow Israel through the partnership with Jewish Federations—an initiative which Houston generously supported.

WHAT HAPPENED WITH HINENI HOUSTON?

We are excited to share that the implementation of ideas gathered through the 2022-2023 **Hineni Houston** listening journey is already making a transformative impact on our community. This initiative, driven by the insights of our Jewish community, reflects your commitment to shaping the future of Jewish Houston.

Hineni Houston was launched by the Federation as part of our strategic planning efforts. With input from 1,200 participants in the Greater Houston area, we explored the central question: "What are your aspirations for Houston's Jewish community, now and for the future?"

Thanks to your support and involvement, bold aspirations emerged, leading to the formation of committees addressing critical areas of **Affordability, Communications, Education, Inclusion, and Leadership**. Your contributions fueled this process, enabling us to build a shared vision and work toward actionable goals.

Two unforeseen events shifted our timeline and expanded our scope of work: the October 7, 2023, attack on Israel by Hamas and the growing need to address antisemitism in our community. In response, we prioritized initiatives in **Teen Engagement** and **Public Affairs**, addressing urgent challenges with the resources you helped provide.

We are proud to announce that the Federation's Board of Trustees has approved the recommendations from these committees, integrating their work into the Federation's core operations strategy. Your contributions enabled us to allocate an additional **\$233,000** toward new local initiatives that are already advancing our shared priorities.

This marks a significant milestone in bringing your aspirations to life.

While research continues in key areas such as Affordability and Leadership, we will share updates as implementation plans take shape. To fully realize our community vision, we are exploring a significant fundraising effort and look forward to your partnership in making it a success.

Through the roles as convener, connector, funder, and innovator, the Federation serves as the symbolic menorah for Jewish life, building on the foundation of collective Jewish community and shining light on Judaism in the most diverse, geographically spread, 4th largest city in the United States.

Your philanthropy guides our path. Philanthropy is the “shamash,” the “helper” candle that makes everything else possible. How Does the Federation Touch Lives?

The Federation works diligently to connect people to their Judaism and to Israel. Our hope is that all Jewish people in the Greater Houston area can participate in Jewish life in ways that are meaningful for them. Here are some practical samples of what this looks like.

EDUCATION

The Federation supports students, families, and educators in early childhood, congregational, and day schools.

Education is the foundation of a thriving Jewish future, and the Federation remains committed to nurturing Jewish learning across all ages and abilities. This year, we supported more than **121 educators through nine networks**, fostering collaboration and innovation across day schools, congregational schools, and early childhood programs.

Notable successes include the **ElevatEd program**, where Houston became the only pilot city to fully fill its cohort, providing professional mentorship to teachers. Houston-area Jewish early childhood education programs had **30 mentees** and **24 mentors** participating. The ElevatEd program addresses the urgent crisis around recruitment and retention of early childhood educators.

We have a strong Education team that has been staffed to address community need.

We are growing our work in academic inclusion in response to community feedback from Hineni Houston. In November 2024, the Federation proudly welcomed Amy Schraier into the role of Jewish Education Inclusion Coordinator with the goal of increasing access to Jewish education for all students.

Having this position will enable the Federation to address disability inclusion in all aspects of Jewish education in the Greater Houston area. Schraier aims to work with Houston's Jewish schools and parents to create and support a sense of belonging for children with diverse learning profiles and their families in the fabric of the Jewish community.

TEEN ENGAGEMENT

There is no more crucial time to engage teens and keep them connected to their Judaism and Israel.

Through **Kehillah High**, we provided **164 teens** with a safe space to explore their Jewish identity, build leadership skills, and connect with peers. This work is critical to fostering a sense of pride and belonging in Jewish life, especially during pivotal moments like the community solidarity events following October 7.

Kehillah High celebrated its first year under the umbrella of the Federation in 2024, graduated its ninth class, and introduced the Teen Impact Awards recognizing outstanding contributions. Kehillah High began in 2015 with the support of the Federation as a partnership between Congregations Beth Israel, Beth Yeshurun, and Brith Shalom as a way to keep Jewish teens engaged post-b'nai mitzvah. Now, as a part of Federation, it continues to expand to include teens from across the community.

PUBLIC AFFAIRS

Connecting with elected officials, weighing in on policy matters, and advocating for Houston’s Jewish community has become a critical part of our day-to-day work.

The issues covered in outreach include the rise in antisemitism, public safety and the Nonprofit Security Grant Program, the war in Israel and how it impacts our community, and local issues such as flooding and decisions by area school districts.

Some notable accomplishments include successfully lobbying to modify the 2024-2025 Houston ISD calendar to align with Jewish fall holidays, and advocating with local school boards not to implement “the Chaplain Bill”—no Houston area school districts opted to replace mental health counselors with chaplains. More than 100 elected officials and faith leaders attended the Federation-hosted community vigil, marking one year since the attacks of October 7th, and close to 100 elected officials and faith and community partners attended our interfaith community seder.

LOCAL IMPACT FUND

The Federation awarded \$188,360 in its second year of grants from the Local Impact Fund to support 17 programs that respond to the community priorities determined in the 2022-2023 Hineni Houston listening journey.



Grants range from \$3,000 to \$20,000, and the majority of programs are collaborative between multiple organizations. All local Jewish organizations were invited to apply for new or expanding programs that align with the Fund’s priorities. This year, cross-organizational collaboration became a requirement of the Fund, which applied to all new grant applicants. Four programs were renewed for their second year of funding.

Rabbi Edwin Goldberg of Congregation Beth Shalom of The Woodlands shared the importance of receiving a grant for its “B’yachad” or “Better Together” program to bring together multiple faith groups to build bridges between religions. This program has not only helped educate the greater Woodlands community, but also created a relationship between synagogue leaders and Christian allies.

“The Woodlands and its surrounding areas are full of Christian neighbors who support Jews and Judaism but are not aware of our current concerns regarding antisemitism. The last 15 months has only made the gap larger. Our need is to educate and enlist our well-meaning neighbors, so they become advocates. Without this grant from the Federation, we would have not been able to offer the program with security and support that we needed. Our congregants feel their neighbors “get” the issue of antisemitism now and the dialogue of understanding continues to develop. In short, through the vision and generosity of the Federation, being Jewish in The Woodlands has felt like a blessing because of our ability to educate our neighbors and feel supported by them.”

SECURITY

Thorough our Jewish Community Security Program, the Federation trains individuals and supports security needs of organizations.

Key achievements since the launch of the program include:

- **Security Support:** Provided security consultations to more than **75 Jewish organizations** across Houston, including synagogues, schools, camps, and community centers.
- **Training:** Trained **more than 1,436 community members** on safety protocols and emergency preparedness since the program's inception.
- **Nonprofit Security Grants:** The Federation was instrumental in helping secure more than **\$6.3 million** (\$1M in 2021; \$700K in 22; \$1.6 M in 2023; \$3M in 2024) **in national Nonprofit Security Grants for area Jewish institutions.** The security program facilitates this process by conducting local assessments at no cost to the organization, so it has the necessary and complex supporting documentation to apply for these grants.
- **Incident Reporting:** Launched and maintained the **online Incident Reporting Form (IRF)** on the Federation's website enabling real-time suspicious activity reporting. Between the IRF and other methods, there have been **274 reports recorded** since 2022.
- **Law Enforcement Coordinated Responses:** Interfaced with law enforcement on 69 incidents within our Jewish community to ensure quick, coordinated action. (January 2024 to September 2024)

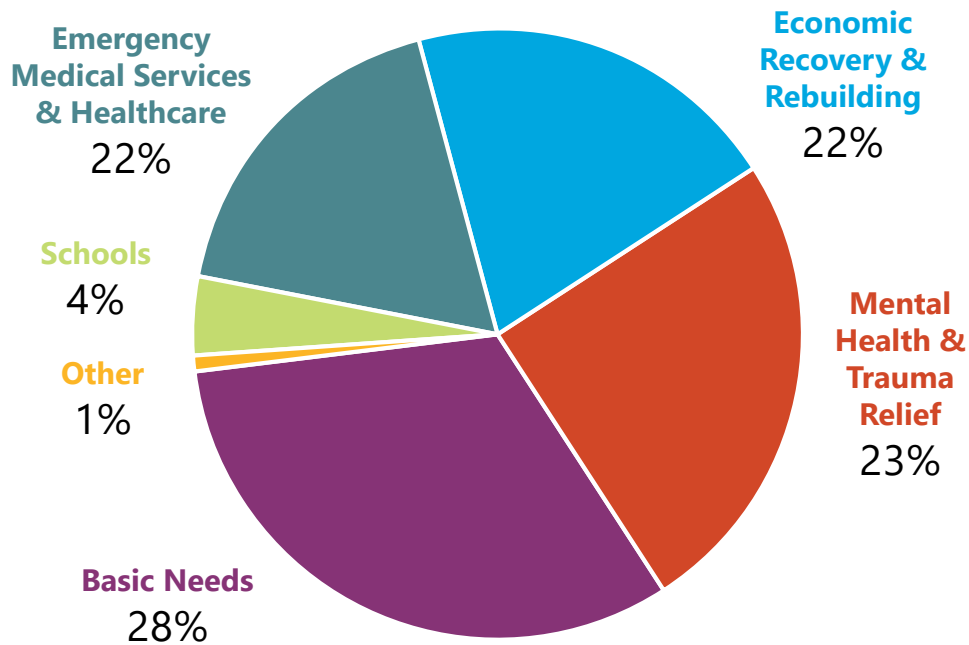
